Abstract

This deliverable provides details on the dedicated project micro-website hosted on the Politecnico di Torino website.

The Chair's website is one of the main tools used by this project to promote its activities and to achieve its objective of raising awareness on key issues in the debate on digital societies and law in the Mediterranean context.

I. Website overview

The project focuses on digital societies and law, with a particular emphasis on the EU regulatory framework, examining its impact and influence on different Mediterranean countries, including non-EU countries.

Given this geographical scope, the project website is in English to provide broad access to academic partners (Teaching Teams) and the wide audience that, in the Mediterranean context, may be interested in the various resources and content made available (blog posts, seminar and conference recordings, publications, etc.).

Based on the project's image, which focuses on the Mediterranean Sea, the website's graphic design mainly uses blue and white colours, which recall the sea, as well as images related to the sea or, in blog posts, to the specific Mediterranean environment.

In terms of target audience, it comprises four different groups (students, academia, civil society and business, and policymakers) who may use the same content differently. For example, blog posts can provide timely and specific information to students and civil society, while conference/seminar recordings can be of interest to policymakers to explore certain key topics, but also to scholars and students to better understand and learn more about different opinions and ongoing debates on discussed themes.

The content made available on the Chair's website can also easily be used for e-learning by colleagues teaching law & technology or other more sector-specific subjects, such as human rights and data protection.

The structure of the website will be adapted throughout the life cycle of the project to meet changing needs as the project progresses. However, the current version of the website includes all the features and sections necessary for effective communication and dissemination of project activities.

II. Structure and content

The Chair's website is divided into nine main sections (Home, Project, Team, Teaching, Events, Publications, News and Contacts), as described in detail in the following subsections. All pages include a reference to the project number, the EU logo, and the logo composed of the project name and the logo of the Politecnico di Torino, which will be replaced by a dedicated logo in the coming months. They also include links to the Chair's social media accounts.

This micro-site is hosted on the Politecnico di Torino website (https://www.digimed.polito.it/) and aims to be a gateway for the interaction between project partners and a showcase for those interested in the themes covered by the project.

The website structure consists of dissemination and interactive components. The dissemination components include information on the Chair's partners and the Advisory Board, contact information, event announcements (conferences, seminars, and workshops) and related videos, teaching activities, publications, and recent achievements. Interactive components include an active blog with posts by project staff and Advisory Board members on the project and project-related content.


II.1 Homepage

The Chair <u>promotes Mediterranean studies in computer law</u> through an interdisciplinary crossfertilisation, contributing to reducing the existing gap in the field of computer law that affects Mediterranean countries, which are often under-represented in the global arena.

The Chair aims to amplifty the voice and participation of Mediterranean countries in the EU regulatory and policy debate. This will enrich the discussion at EU level, benefiting from the significant scientific output in humanities and legal studies of Mediterranean countries with a positive interdisciplinary cross-fertilisation for the development of human-centric digital societies and AU.

The project brings together academic staff (Teaching Team) from several <u>Mediterranean universities in Spain, Greece, Malta, Cyprus, and Turkey.</u>

Needs and objectives


The apparent uniformity of the existing and proposed EU regulatory framework for the digital society needs to be investigated in the light of the <u>socio-cultural component</u> that, from a legal perspective, may impact on its application and contextualisation.

To examine this relationship between the EU legal framework and its application in specific cultural contexts, this project focuses on the Mediterranean area.

Considering EU data and technology regulations through the lens of the Mediterranean culture will contribute not only to their effective implementation, but also to properly address the specificity of Member States.

In addition, the Mediterranean perspective will also <u>create a bridge in this field with non-EU cultures</u>, which will be actively involved in the open events organised by the Chair.

Fostering this pan-Mediterranean dialogue about EU regulation and policies is crucial in several fields. The overall objective of the Chair is thus to <u>open up a new field in legal</u> interdisciplinary studies focused on digital Mediterranean studies, contributing to address several policy and cultural issues in the Mediterranean area, such as <u>migration</u>, <u>maritime trade</u>, <u>cybersecurity</u>, and inclusive Al-based smart city development.



II.3 Team presentation

The Team page is divided into three main blocks dedicated to the Chair holder, the Advisory Board, and the Teaching Core Team respectively. It includes a short biography of the Chair holder and the affiliations and profiles of all the members of the Advisory Board and the Teaching Team, available via a rotating card (see, for example, the profile of prof. Alessandro Mantelero

Associate Professor of Private Law and Law & Technology at Polytechnic University of Turin.

Alessandro Mantelero has served as a scientific advisor on AI, data protection and human rights for the Council of Europe for several years (Hoc Committee on Artificial Intelligence – CAHAI, Convention 108 – Consultative Committee, 2016-2022). As an expert on data regulation and human rights he advises national and international organizations, including the United Nations, the EU Agency for Fundamental Rights, and the European Commission. He has held visiting appointments in several universities, including Berkman Klein Center for Internet & Society at Harvard University, Nanjing – NUITS, Universitat Oberta de Catalunya, Universidad de Murcia, and joined the University of Oxford as a visiting research fellow at the Oxford Internet Institute in 2013 and 2014, working on data protection and Big Data.

He is Associate Editor of Computer Law & Security Review and member of the Editorial Board of European Data Protection Law Review.

His main research interests and projects focus on Law and Technology with publications on data protection, AI, data ethics and human rights. His latest book is Beyond Data. Human Rights, Ethical and Social Impact Assessment in AI (T.M.C. Asser Press – Springer 2022).




II.4 Teaching activities






